

HOW TO PROVIDE COMMENTS

(Note disclosure statement on the back of this form)

There are several ways to provide comments during the Environmental Impact Analysis Process underway for the proposed Oregon Airspace Initiative:

1. If you wish to make a *written comment*:

- Fill out the registration card
- Mark the box indicating you wish to make a written comment
- Give the card to a staff member
- Mail the Written Comment Form or a letter to the address indicated on the form

OR

- Email your comments to ang.env.comments@ang.af.mil and include "Oregon Airspace Initiative" in the subject line.

OR

- Fill out a *Written Comment Form* and drop it in the collection box
- In order to be addressed in the Draft EIS, written comments must be received by 21 July 2013.

2. If you wish to record a *comment in private* using the digital recorder:

- Fill out the registration card
- Mark the box indicating you wish to record your comment privately
- Give the card to a staff member
- You will be called in turn to provide your comments

Please Note: All oral and written comments will receive full and equal consideration and will be included in the official Administrative Record.

DATA REQUIRED BY THE PRIVACY ACT OF 1974
(5 U.S.C. 552A)**

1. Principal Purpose: Your name, address and comments, if provided during the EIAP are:

- Used to compile mailing lists for sending project reports, brochures, and other information concerning the EIS to those individuals and groups who might be interested.
- Forwarded to federal, state and local agencies and elected officials.
- Used to compile mailing lists for other projects in which the person supplying the information might have an interest.
- Compiled in a Record of Public Meeting and made available to the public.
- Published in project reports and made available to interested individuals and groups.

2. Effects of Individual Not Providing Information:

Failure to provide the information requested would prevent delivery of documents and notification of further developments. However, documents will be available in local public areas, such as libraries, and their locations published in local newspapers.
